





Here are a few books we have at the library that we know you will love!

A Ms. Jazuk Favourite



'Evernight' by Ross Mackenzie is a dark fantasy about Larabel Fox, a girl who can see monsters that no one else can. She is drawn into a shadowy world where nightmares walk and danger follows her everywhere. The story blends eerie atmosphere, emotional depth and fast-paced adventure while exploring fear,

bravery and what it means to face the darkness inside yourself! I'd recommend it to readers who enjoy creepy, imaginative fantasy with strong characters and a slightly spooky edge — a fantastic read!

All Around the World


'Earth Heroes' by Lily Dyu is a non-fiction collection of inspiring true stories about well-known figures like Greta Thunberg and Sir David Attenborough to lesser-known innovators and activists taking action to protect the planet and combat climate change. The book blends engaging narrative and striking illustrations to make



environmental issues accessible and empowering. I'd recommend it to anyone who wants to feel inspired about environmental stewardship and learn practical examples of people making a difference in the world.

An Absolute Classic


'The Borrowers' by Mary Norton follows the tiny Clock family — Pod, Homily and their daughter Arrietty — who live secretly beneath the floorboards of a house and survive by "borrowing" small items from the humans above. When Arrietty befriends a human boy, their hidden world is threatened, leading to moments of danger, bravery and change. I'd recommend this book to readers who enjoy imaginative, cosy fantasy with heart, especially those who love clever world-building and gentle adventure.



Mary Norton won the 1952 Carnegie Medal from the Library Association, recognising *The Borrowers* as the year's outstanding children's book by a British author!

Inspiring Stories

Shackleton's Journey by William Grill is a beautifully illustrated non-fiction retelling of Sir Ernest Shackleton's 1914 Antarctic expedition. It reveals how his ship, *Endurance*, became trapped in ice and how Shackleton and his crew struggled across frozen seas in search of rescue. With rich, coloured-pencil drawings and



carefully researched details that bring the harsh environment and heroic human endurance to life for young readers, it blends factual history with striking visuals. I would recommend it to anyone who loves true adventure and history presented in an engaging, accessible way — especially to younger readers or families looking for an inspiring tale of courage and survival in one of the most challenging environments on Earth.





by Benjamin Dean






Fast forward to the shops! We were near the book section. One called 'The Creakers' really caught my eye.

I bought it myself, with money that I had saved, and little did I know but this would be a start of a chapter for me loving books!


Ms Maxted

Mr Egan





The library is so lucky to have received donations, made purchases and acquired new books this past half term! The more the merrier!






