


Inspiring Stories!

All Around the World



Charlie and the Chocolate Factory by Roald Dahl, illustrated by Quentin Blake (Colour Edition)


There is no question that every school library should have a bit of Roald Dahl in it. Dahl's timeless stories have been read and enjoyed by many

This book beautifully written companion novel to **Skellig**, told through the unique voice of Mina, a curious and imaginative girl who sees the world differently from other people. book takes the form



of Mina's journal, filled with thoughts, poems, and "extraordinary activities" that celebrate creativity, language and wonder. Through her eyes, readers explore themes of freedom, grief, learning and self-expression. *My Name is Mina* reminds us to embrace our individuality, question the ordinary and find magic in everyday life. Almond's poetic writing makes Mina's world both inspiring and unforgettable.






I have always loved books, and it makes me so happy to just be in a room full of them all day and to be able to help students and staff find what they want.


• What do you love about St. Anne's and its library?




• Why do you like being a librarian?

The late Pope Francis declared 2025 the year of the **Jubilee**, with the theme being **Pilgrims of Hope**.


To commemorate the Jubilee, we have purchased an absolutely beautiful new bible for the Library with the money we have raised from the book sale.

Students will be able to use it for study and competing tasks.


Non-Fiction Month Book List

In honour of Non-Fiction Month, we here at St. Anne's have been thinking about how there are so many wonderful non-fiction books out there in the world!


